Classroom Activities:

Creative Writing:

Write a short story, set in the future, from the point of view of you in your 'next' life. Where would you imagine yourself?

Write a newspaper report about Alina's final capture. Keep the most important journalistic questions in mind: Who, where, when, what, why, how?

Drama: Act out a live news broadcast about Alina's escape from prison.

Art/mapping: Draw a map of the island prison where Alina is held. Create a code in small groups and let other groups try to decipher it.

Team Debates:

In *Soulprint*, Alina is held for a crime she committed in a previous life. But in real life, many prisoners serve long sentences for crimes they committed many years prior, in some ways when they were considered 'a different person'. Should a person continue to serve out a sentence if they can show they've changed, or been rehabilitated?



Classroom Discussion Topics:

Open a classroom discussion (or team debate) about people held in captivity without charge or trial because they are suspected of a crime or knowing of one, e.g. Guantanamo Bay/alleged terrorists.

This is also a good starting point to discuss the detention of alleged spies or rebels in history (e.g. Stasi Germany).

If a person commits a crime under the influence of drugs, can they truly be held responsible for their actions? Does your opinion change if the drugs were consumed willingly or unwillingly?

If the science existed to discover the lives your soul had once belonged to, would you want to know? Why or why not?

The "science" of soul printing is fiction. But many modern day medical advances would have sounded like science fiction 100 or more years ago. Discuss some examples (e.g. cloning, antibiotics, vaccines, DNA testing, organ transplantation, myoelectric prosthesis, laser-eye-surgery, prenatal diagnosis, 3D ultrasound).

What medical advances do you think might we see in the future, that sound like science fiction today?

Cross-media:

In Tom Cruise movie *Minority Report* people are convicted of crimes they have not committed yet. Do you think that this is morally right? <u>http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Minority_Report_%28film%29</u>
